## Road Paving & Secondary Road filling

The road paving works have finished however we are still \$9000 short to complete the project as the actual measurement showed an increase over the estimated miles paved. For all of you who are enjoying the paved road and can help at this time and haven't already donated, please do so. You can contact Kathi Barrington by phone or email and she will arrange to pick up your donation. If you cannot help right now we would be happy to accept your pledge of funds for a future date for these works.

The aprons for Banana Patch Lane, Lignum Vitae and Curlew Drive will commence this week. The latter two aprons are high traffic areas so really need the apron to protect the road. Please donate to the apron project if you can as this was not included in the overall paving contract. The curbing for Seasage Hill Road is being looked at now and hopefully this project will complete within a month and before any heavy rains occur.

The 5mph speed bump at the entrance to LBH's has been ordered and we will be placing a further two gentler speed bumps along the straightaways to control speeds. The speed limit signage and speed bump signage will be ordered shortly and installed once it arrives on island. Please help if you can by contacting [katmike@tciway.tc](mailto:katmike@tciway.tc)

Secondary road works are progressing with the Beach Drive first followed by Lignum Vitae, Seasage Hill Road and Flame Tree Circle and so on. The roads will be filled, compacted and then graded providing a longer lasting repair than grading only.

We are very grateful to them for this service and in particular to Camille for keeping us all informed regarding incidents that occurred in LBH's and other areas. She liaises with Fred Skovberg who is the NW Coordinator for TCI and passes on information from incident reports, CAPPs, and other issues involving the various NW programs throughout Provo. One of the findings she has advised on is that radios are the most effective way of communication for NW and that she is happy to order a bulk supply of radios so anyone wanting to purchase one can contact her directly to arrange this.

Camille has advised that she can no longer stay on as a Director of LBHPOA nor lead the NW program due to other commitments and we want to thank her for her service. She has advised she will stay on until a new NW coordinator for LBH's takes over.

It was agreed at the last AGM that NW will run independently of the LBHPOA and to that end anyone residing in LBH's can head up our NW.

### Dune Plants and Uses

#### **Bay Tansy**



Bay Tansy or Soap Bush (*Ambrosia hispida*) is another one of my personal favorites due to its wonderfully pungent smell. This plant has long vine like stems that grow along the ground with lacey fernlike leaves on alternate sides. You will have to look close for the tiny flowers that are only millimeters in diameter. The leaves actually feel kind of coarse to the touch, but will leave a really nice smell on your hands.

Medicinally, it is said that the plant has antihistaminic properties and a tea is made for colds and allergies. It has also been used to help control mild skin irritations and historically in the making of soaps as per its more common name.
